REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL

Report for the year ended 31 December 2005

The International Council, who are also the directors of Peace Brigades International, submit their annual report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2005.

Legal Status

Peace Brigades International is a charitable, non-profit organization, incorporated under the laws of the State of Washington, USA, which has been granted tax-exempt status under section 501(c)(3) of the US Internal Revenue Code under tax registration number 91-1179750.

We are registered as an overseas company registered number (FCO19368) in the United Kingdom, under s.691 of the Companies Act 1985.

There are 16 PBI Country Groups. While recognition by PBI and use of the PBI name depends on each Country Group's adherence to PBI principles PBI Country Groups are independent bodies that determine their own structure and are legally responsible for their own actions. These financial statements do not include the accounts of PBI Country Groups. Similarly, PBI's Brussels European Office was an independent legal and financial entity in 2005 and is not included in these statements, although the BEO is now merging with PBI and will be included in the 2006 audit.

Mission Statement

PBI works to open a space for peace in which conflicts can be addressed in a non-violent way. PBI applies a strategy of international presence and concern that supports local initiatives and contributes to developing a culture of peace and justice. We act on request of local organisations and groups working for human rights, social change and development of civil society, which use non-violent means in regions where there is oppression and conflict.

The aim of PBI's international presence is to accompany both political and social processes through a joint strategy of deterring violence and promoting active non violence. PBI's international teams of volunteers use methods such as protective accompaniment, peace education, independent observation and analysis of the conflict situation. In addition, PBI learns about, develops and models forms of non-violent intervention. PBI, where possible, initiates contacts with all the parties to a conflict in order to establish and inform of our presence. PBI supports this work through a broad international network of organisations and individuals. PBI's identity is built upon non-hierarchical structures and consensual processes.

Review of Accounts and Resources

During the year ended 31 December 2005, the activities of the organisation resulted in net outgoing resources of \$48,170. This resulted in total funds (restricted and unrestricted) of \$459,969 being carried forward at 31 December 2005. Of this \$268,887 is restricted by donors for project work, a further \$47,400 is invested in fixed assets and the balance of \$143,682 in unrestricted reserves.

REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL

The total income of the organisation in 2005 was \$2,703,722 (2004: \$2,864,759). Our income decreased by 5% from 2004. We raised our income in 17 countries. Our funding base is a good balance of trust, foundation and government funding. Significant new funders included the International Commission of Jurists, EV Mission Wupertal, Peaceworkers USA and the Belgian Embassy in Indonesia. We received significant increases from funders as diverse as the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Diakonisches Werk der Evangelishen Kirche, Trocaire, CMC/AMA, Mugarik Gabe, Christian Aid, Misereor, Prisoners of Conscience and Oxfam, and continuing strong support from the Canadian International Development Fund, Diakonia Sweden, the German Foreign Ministry and the Sigrid Rausing Trust. We successfully opened a new project in Nepal in 2005, mainly through funding from the International Commission of Jurists and Peaceworkers USA.

The total expenditure of the organisation in 2005 was \$2,751,892 (2004: \$2,891,099), a decrease of 5%. This decrease in spending was a direct response to the corresponding 5% drop in income in the year. The decrease in funding in 2005 made us review all areas of activities for efficiency. Decisions made in the year, such as employing accountants and administrative staff in project countries, will continue to feed into lower overheads in 2006 and 2007.

The overall financial situation is continuously monitored to ensure the organisation operates at a level of activity appropriate to available funding. PBI's policy is to maintain a general reserve of between 20-25% of current expenditure. At the year end our reserves were \$459,969, which is 17% of expenditure. The international Council and the projects are proactively working to restore these reserves to above 20% over the coming years.

Peace Brigades International expresses its thanks to all its volunteers and staff who contribute their time to its many activities. In 2005 we had an average of 67 volunteers in the field. It is not practicable to quantify the value of the many hundreds of unpaid skilled hours that volunteers in the field, in country groups and in the International Secretariat contribute each year to further the work of PBI but this time is critical to the effectiveness of the organisation's work.

REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL

Review of Activities

The main focus of PBI's work continues to be its well-developed protective accompaniment programme. This programme has two complementary components: 1. the volunteers in the field who physically accompany human rights defenders and 2. the network of 16 PBI Country Groups and project offices who complement the field presence by managing a well developed network of political supporters, members, donors, sympathetic organisations and media contacts that we can rely on for support and advocacy on behalf of our protective accompaniment work in the field. Importantly, these networks act quickly to maximise international pressure when we alert them to the plight of any group or individual that our field teams assess to be under particular threat.

In 2005 our main activities continued to be our established protective accompaniment programmes in Colombia, Guatemala, Indonesia and Mexico and the governance role of the International Secretariat. Our newly established Nepal Project carried out a security training and advance team mission in Nepal from April to July 2005, carried under the auspices of a broader International Commission of Jurists' initiative to support human rights defenders. In collaboration with the PBI Brussels European Office, the project implemented a course of security trainings for human rights defenders in Nepal, integrated with a strategy to train pre-selected Nepali candidates as trainers, the goal of which was to maximize learning and to help implement best security practices for human rights defenders and Human Rights Organisations in Nepal.

Looking forward to 2006

In mid-2005 PBI held its tri-ennial General Assembly, which approved a strategic plan for 2005-2011. This plan sustains PBI's emphasis on the use of international presence for protection, and opens the door to an expanded advocacy and policy presence on the global scene. It also establishes a series of objectives for international organisational strengthening to better support and sustain our fieldwork and achieve greater sustainability. Among these, the International Council is putting special emphasis in the initial years of the plan's implementation on the strengthening of financial policies and systems, and achieving better coordinated fundraising.

REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL

Organisation/Directors

The General Assembly of Peace Brigades International meets every three years to define the strategic direction of the organisation. The International Council is responsible for ensuring the implementation of the decisions made by the General Assembly and for day-to-day governance of the organisation. The detailed mandate and composition of both the General Assembly and the International Council are laid down in the By-Laws of Peace Brigades International.

INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The International Council is responsible for producing accounts in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

TO THE INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL OF PEACE BRIGADES INTERNATIONAL

We have audited the accounts of Peace Brigades International for the year ended 31 December 2005 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and the related notes. These accounts have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the International Council, as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the International Council those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than Peace Brigades International and the International Council as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL AND AUDITORS

As described in the Statement of International Council's Responsibilities the International Council is responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Our responsibility is to audit the accounts in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland).

We report to you our opinion as to whether the accounts give a true and fair view. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the International Council's Report is not consistent with the accounts, if the entity has not kept proper accounting records or if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

We read the International Council's Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

BASIS OF AUDIT OPINION

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Audit Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the accounts. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the directors in the preparation of the accounts, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the entity's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the accounts are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the accounts.

OPINION In our opinion:

the accounts give a true and fair view, in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice, of the state of Peace Brigades International's affairs as at 31 December 2005 and of its incoming resources and resources expended for the year then ended.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2005

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention, applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards and, where relevant, the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), Accounting and Reporting by Charities, issued in October 2000.

The accounts have been produced in United States Dollars as that is the main operating currency of the entity.

b) PBI Country Groups

There are 16 PBI Country Groups. While recognition by PBI and use of the PBI name depends on each Country Group's adherence to PBI principles PBI Country Groups are independent bodies that determine their own structure and are legally responsible for their own actions. These financial statements do not include the accounts of PBI Country Groups.

c) Fund accounting

All of the entity's operations are either part of an individual project or are else part of the International Secretariat. Consequently income and expenditure has been split across these headings. These categories are different to those set out by the SORP but the International Council feels the fund categories used provide a fairer position of the operations of the entity.

d) Incoming resources

Donations, including those from country groups, are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when they are received unless they are for a specific period in which case they are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Grants are included on a receivable basis. Consequently debtors are included for grants that relate to the current year but have not been received by the year end. Where received grants are for a time period that covers all, or part of a period in future financial years, the relevant proportion is deferred and included in creditors.

No amounts are included in the accounts for services donated by volunteers.

e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under appropriate expenditure headings. Expenditure includes irrecoverable VAT where appropriate.

f) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are capitalised and depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost over the expected useful economic lives as follows:

Motor vehicles

25% straight line

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

33% straight line

g) Operating leases

Rentals in respect of operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period in which the cost is incurred.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2005 (CONTINUED)

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

h) Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities are re-translated at the year end exchange rate with all differences being taken to the Statement of Financial Activities. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction except where the base currency of the project is not United States Dollars. In these cases, the results are translated at an average exchange rate for the year with any translation exchange differences being taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

i) Repatriation

The estimated costs of repatriating staff and volunteers are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis.
